The state conference of Arizona NOW, held March 17 in Tucson, was exhilarating and inspiring. It was co-sponsored by the Tucson chapter of NOW and the Pima Area Labor Federation. Attendees included 55 who pre-registered and some last-minute walk-ins.

The keynote speaker, Dr. Sanjam Ahluwalia, is a professor in the Department of History and Women's and Gender Studies Program at Northern Arizona University.

A lively four-member panel of elected officials was composed of Rep. Charlene Fernandez of Yuma, who represents Legislative District 4 in the state House of Representatives; Channel Powe, a member of the Balsz

school board and the Maricopa County Transportation Advisory Board; Rep. Pamela Powers-Hannley, who represents District 9 in the state House of Representatives and who introduced the Equal Rights Amendment in 2017 and 2018; and Karin Uhlich, who was elected to three terms on the Tucson City Council from 2005-2017.

At lunch, the audience was entertained by the Esperanza Dance Project. It is comprised of young people who believe in eradicating the stigma, secrecy and shame associated with childhood sexual violence. They deliver a message of hope, strength and empowerment to audiences through high school multimedia performance tours in Arizona.

In the afternoon, "Women in the Workforce" was a discussion of labor unions in Arizona from a woman's perspective, and then the crowd dispersed into three breakout sessions: "Emerge! Center for Domestic Violence;" a reproductive rights action forum led by Planned Parenthood Arizona; and a YMCA program, "Standing Up for Racial Justice with #MeToo."

Professor Ahluwalia, in her wide-ranging speech, noted that Frederick Douglass was the only black man at the women's rights convention at Seneca Falls, N.Y., in 1848. She said Anna J. Cooper is known as the mother of black feminism. A replica of the moving speech "Ain't I A Woman" delivered by Sojourner Truth in 1851 can be heard online. Ahluwalia said that the word feminism was the most searched word in Webster's English dictionary in 2017.

Discussing misogyny, she told the group that there are 200 million missing women in the world. She said that intersectional feminism is vital.

In the question-and-answer session, audience member Shelley McEwan of Oracle recommended the revealing book "Nomadland" about an underclass of women who live in vans and recreational vehicles.

Panelist Fernandez said that to reach pay equity, "Women have to be at the table. Decisions are made over our heads, and no one asks what we think." She

said that until the House speaker and the Senate president are women, "we will not see change."

She drew audience laughs when she said that a male colleague in the Legislature stood up and said that women were grandstanding because the women want to make the men look bad.

"I have news for him. It doesn't take us to make them look bad."

Channel Powe urged the crowd to think of women who need mentors and then to tell them, "You don't have to be your circumstance. Yes, you can. You can make this world a better place. ... We need to uplift each other."

She added, "A lot of times, men are empowered to stand up and speak out. They've got the bro code, the bromance thing going on. Think about being your sisters' keeper."

Powers-Hannley said Republicans in the Legislature don't want to hear the ERA bill because they don't want to be embarrassed.

"We have been embarrassing them every week."

She said that since Don Shooter was expelled from the AZ Legislature after accusations of sexual misconduct, "some have gone to charm school. But still, you see racism and sexism every day in the Arizona House. They treat Latinas worse. They interrupt them in committee meetings."

Uhlich said that intersectionality is critically important, and she added, "We need to recognize how much we need each other as oppressed people."

Powe urged the conference attendees to become leaders and not to wait until they have official titles.

"We don't have to wait for a placard with our name on it to be a leader. We don't have to wait until we're elected to be a leader. We don't have to wait until someone gives us permission to speak up. ... We have to shake the ground."

Fernandez reminded the group of the importance of voting, but that only voting is not enough.

"Vote, and take five people with you."
